At a high level, solar panels are made up of solar cells, which absorb sunlight. They use this sunlight to create direct current (DC) electricity through a process called "the photovoltaic effect."

When sunlight hits the photovoltaic cells within solar panels, these specialized cells capture the sun's energy and convert it into direct current (DC) electricity.
